TWEEN SESSION DETAILS:

1-Week Sessions (Session I and Session VI)

Fun and fast-paced, our one-week sessions at the beginning and end of the summer are designed to increase students' ability to create spontaneously, connect with one another on the stage, use their bodies and voices more expressively, develop unique characters, and have fun with the art of making theatre. These camps are focused on improvisation work that will benefit actors of all experience levels. These sessions culminate in skills demonstrations for friends and family rather than scripted performances.

Musical Theatre Camp for Tweens (four weeks, Session II/III): Matilda the Musical, Jr.

Join us for this fun musical retelling of Roald Dahl's beloved story. Matilda is a girl with astonishing wit, intelligence...and special powers. Ignored by her self-centered parents, Matilda finds an understanding companion in her schoolteacher, Miss Honey. But the school's mean headmistress, Miss Trunchbull, hates children and just loves thinking up new ways to make life miserable for those who don't abide by her rules. In the end, Matilda's courage and cleverness inspires her classmates to rise up and reclaim the fun of childhood. ADMISSION

The Theatre Lab's Summer Acting Institute for Teens is designed to immerse young adults in the art of acting—from mastering the essential principles of the craft to participating in a public performance of a challenging contemporary work at the end of the four weeks.

The curriculum includes audition seminars, improvisational workshops, voice and speech training, movement training, and scene study, as well as special programs designed to give interested students insight into the workings of the professional theatre community. In addition to the

daily training, students will present a new telling of Euripides' *Medea*, set in a modern day high school and reframed as a teenage revenge tragedy.

The play: Medea—a perennial outsider in her school—is betrayed by her charismatic boyfriend Jason. But blood will have blood and Jason has no idea what's coming. With great roles for students of all types and genders, this play offers a unique opportunity to experience the excitement of Greek drama while taking on contemporary acting challenges.

Please note: Medea explores mature themes.

All institute classes are taught by professional actors and directors. The summer program is directed by actor Deb Gottesman, a founder and co-director of The Theatre Lab, and includes a staff of highly trained instructors and specialists including award-winning director/playwright Randy Baker (Rorschach Theatre), who will direct the final production.

ACTING CLASSES

Summer Acting Institute participants take all of the following courses:

THE DRAMA WORKSHOP: An improvisational workshop designed to explore core acting skills, including: creating a character, activating needs, developing spontaneity and focus, and communicating effectively with others on stage.

Students will be challenged to discover new ways of thinking, expressing themselves, and creating.

AUDITIONING: An intensive seminar designed to prepare students to perform monologues in an audition setting, this course focuses on developing confidence, rechanneling nervous energy into creative energy, and using the body and voice effectively to tell a story. At the conclusion of the seminar, students use their monologues to audition for *Medea*. All students are guaranteed substantial and interesting roles.

STAGE MOVEMENT: Designed to increase the actor's range of movement and physical expressiveness, this course incorporates elements of mime, dance, and improvisation, as well as training in relaxation and posture development, in order to maximize the potential of the body on stage.

VOICE AND SPEECH: Designed to give students the skills they need for clear, effective speech on stage, this course focuses on developing proper breath control, improving diction and projection, dialect, and maximizing the flexibility and range of the voice.

SCENE STUDY: An intensive exploration of scripted work, this course focuses on developing the actor's process through the introduction of powerful rehearsal techniques. Course culminates in a public performance of *Medea*.

In addition to the above classes, students participate in a variety of special workshops—such as acting for film and TV, mask work, and stage combat—led by guest artists from the Washington theatre community.

ADMISSION

The Theatre Lab is dedicated to providing affordable, accessible training for students seriously interested in learning about the acting process. Applicants will be accepted on the basis of their commitment to exploring the theatre craft and their willingness to collaborate in a group process of discovery with other young artists.

All applicants must complete a written essay expressing their interest in the program. Applicants must also prepare a 90-second monologue for an audition that will be scheduled upon receipt of completed application.

Dubbed "a delicious new musical about Broadway narcissists, Indiana homophobes—and all that zazz" by The New York Times, *The Prom* was an international hit and widely celebrated as one of the funniest musicals ever written.

The musical follows four eccentric Broadway actors who take up social activism in a quest to stay in the spotlight when their careers begin to fade. After a quick scan of social media, they head straight to the conservative town of Edgewater, Indiana, where trouble is brewing over a high school prom. Local girl Emma Nolan wants to take her girlfriend to prom but the PTA is on a mission to keep the high school dance strictly heteronormative. All hell (and hilarity!) breaks loose when the Broadway celebrities muscle in to modernize the town and get Emma to the prom. Most of all, the show has surprising heart and optimism as it explores identity in a polarized world.

From a creative team that wrote *The Drowsy* Chaperone, Elf: The Musical and The Wedding Singer among others, The Prom features boffo up-tempo dance numbers, soaring ballads, and a contemporary score that Variety says is "so full of happiness that you think your heart is about to burst."

The Prom features many memorable characters and a lively ensemble with breakout roles and solo opportunities. As part of their training, students cast in ensemble roles will also have the opportunity to rehearse and perform a solo in a student cabaret, open to the public, during the third week of the program.

Speaking of proms...

One of the 20th century's greatest works of horror (and most intense prom stories) takes center stage in *Carrie: The Musical*, about an outcast who discovers she has telekinetic powers. Painfully shy and bullied by her classmates, Carrie is also lost at home, where her fervently religious mother smothers her with overprotective love. Things take a turn for the better when Carrie is asked to the prom by nice guy Tommy as an act of contrition. But her moment of acceptance is cut short by her school tormentors. Pushed to the brink, Carrie unleashes her destructive power.

While the original 1988 version of *Carrie*: The Musical was full of campy gore, the 2012 rewrite, more aligned with the Oscar-winning movie adaptation of Stephen King's book, is sensitive and poignant, offering ample opportunities for genuine connection. From soulful ballads to frightening duets to raucous rock dance numbers, *Carrie* is a thrilling musical that showcases the singing, dancing and acting talents of its performers.

Carrie features roles for students of all types and genders; the ensemble features the high school classmates who drive the story to its inevitable climax. As part of their training, students cast in ensemble roles will also have the opportunity to rehearse and perform a solo in a student cabaret, open to the public, during the third week of the program.

ABOUT THE MUSICAL THEATRE INSTITUTE FOR TEENS

The Musical Theatre Institute for Teens is an intensive four-week training program in which participants rehearse and perform a full musical production under the guidance of the area's most esteemed directors. The idea behind the institute is to enable young artists to explore challenging, socially relevant material from the contemporary musical theatre world as they receive the intensive voice, movement and acting training essential for professional-level performance. Past productions, including performances of *Big Fish*, *Urinetown*, *Newsies*, *Jesus Christ Superstar*, *Parade*, and *Rent*, have played to critical raves and sold-out houses.

The Musical Theatre Institute is designed to challenge young performers—both artistically and personally—while providing a supportive, caring environment in which to develop. Roles are open to experienced performers as well as those looking to build musical theatre skills. While the emphasis is on performance, students will also receive training in a wide variety of musical theatre disciplines during the rehearsal process, including: vocal production, acting a song, proper breathing technique, movement, building a character, ensemble acting, and more.

The Theatre Lab is a non-profit educational institution dedicated to making the artistic and real-life benefits of quality dramatic arts education accessible to adults and youth in the metropolitan Washington region.

REGISTRATION:

Tuition must be paid in advance. A student is registered only upon receipt of payment in full.

REFUNDS:

You must notify our office in writing before May 15 of withdrawal from the summer program for a full refund minus a \$20 cancellation fee. If you withdraw from the program from May 16-June 9, one half (1/2) of the cost of tuition will be refunded. After June 9, 2023 there are no refunds.

RETURNED CHECKS:

A \$25 fee will be charged for any returned/bounced check.

COVID TESTING:

Any student exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 during the camp day will be sent home and required to show proof of a negative COVID test or, if positive, a fully completed quarantine period prior to returning to the classroom. Specifics around testing protocols will be determined prior to the start of camp and will follow all local, state, and federal guidelines.

MASKS:

At this time, masks will be optional this summer. Lunch and snack breaks will take place outside whenever possible. Note: We will notify families of any changes to this policy if the transmission of COVID has drastically increased in this area, or local, state, or federal guidelines have changed.

DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP:

Drop-off and pick-up will take place at our front entrance at 900 Massachusetts Ave NW. For the safety of our students, staff, and building partners, we keep building access limited.

AGE/GRADE LEVEL:

All participants should be registered only for programs

listed for their grade level as of Fall 2023. We understand that skill and experience levels vary, however students are required to register for their age appropriate programming.

ACCESSIBILITY:

The Theatre Lab is committed to creating an environment where all students can thrive in an inclusive and welcoming space. Located within the Mount Vernon Place United Methodist Church building, the front entrance to The Theatre Lab is accessible and the building contains elevators for access to classrooms. If your child requires assistance, including learning accommodations, please contact our staff prior to enrollment to discuss reasonable and respectful accommodations. We are happy to discuss support strategies to help make sure your child has a successful camp experience.

GUESTS:

In order to provide a safe environment, only registered students are permitted to stay in the classroom during the camp day.

LUNCH AND SNACK:

All participants in our full-day camps should bring a lunch that does not require refrigeration or reheating. Please make sure that your child's lunch does not contain nut products. If you are unable to provide lunch for your child due to financial need, please contact our office immediately and we will arrange to provide a basic lunch. A morning snack will be provided to all participants in our 1st-8th grade programs. No food is provided in the teen programs, but participants are welcome to bring their own food or snacks. There will be designated snack and lunch times for all programs that will take place outside weather permitting.

PHOTOGRAPHY AND VIDEOGRAPHY:

The Theatre Lab reserves the right to use photos and videos taken in our programs for promotional purposes only.

STAFFING:

The Theatre Lab reserves the right to make faculty substitutions in any of our programs.

NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY:

The Theatre Lab does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, gender expression, age, national origin, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, or military status, and complies with all applicable laws governing discrimination.

LATE PICK-UP:

Please be considerate of staff by being on time for pick-up. The Theatre Lab will automatically assess a \$15 late fee if your child is picked up more than 10 minutes after the assigned hour his/her program ends and \$45 if your child is picked up more than 20 minutes past that hour. (Regular camp day ends at 3pm; AfterCare ends at 6pm.)

SUPERVISION:

The Theatre Lab is not responsible for any child or teen in or around our facility beyond the specified hours of the particular program in which they are enrolled.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES:

Students are encouraged to leave all electronic devices at home. If an electronic device causes disruption or distraction in the classroom, TTL staff reserves the right to take the device away until the end of the day.

BEHAVIOR:

The Theatre Lab expects campers to value the contributions of others and to treat fellow students, instructors, and counselors with respect. We reserve the right to dismiss, without refund, any camper whose behavior is inappropriate and disruptive to the successful functioning of the camp group. If a camper poses a direct threat to the safety of themselves or others, in either word or deed, they may be immediately dismissed from the camp program.

CLOSED-TOE SHOES/ APPROPRIATE CLOTHING:

Students must wear closed-toe shoes during the camp day. They should come wearing appropriate clothing that does not restrict movement.

MEDICAL CARE:

In the event of an emergency requiring immediate medical attention, your child will be taken to the nearest hospital emergency room unless Theatre Lab staff is instructed otherwise by parents before the program begins. Theatre Lab faculty members may provide basic first aid but do not administer medication of any kind to campers. If your child requires medication dispensed during the camp day or a special arrangement of any kind, please contact Youth Program Director Terah Herman-Saldaña (terah@ theatrelab.org).

LIABILITY WAIVER:


